

Faculty Journey Map

Professor Smith teaches BIOL 221: Human Anatomy and Physiology at a PALNI-supported institution. The course textbook price repeatedly concerns her because it has caused many students to forgo buying the textbook and a few even drop the class.



She hears about a new PALSave initiative from her library director and receives a flyer referencing the Open Textbook Library (OTL). Upon receiving an invite to attend a workshop, she visits the OTL site where she discovers several books in her field. At the workshop, she learns more about the world of open education.





Not quite convinced, she takes the PALSave representatives up on their offer to receive a stipend in exchange for writing a review. Looking closely at the freely available Anatomy and Physiology book while writing the review, she discovers the quality is comparable to her current expensive text.





Professor Smith is excited but dreads the time-consuming work of adopting the new textbook to her course objectives.

Fortunately, the PALSave program facilitates librarian and instructional designer support for this process.

Happily, she converts her course to use the open textbook that summer with the help of the team.

He is finding it challenging to work and keep up with a full course load!



His textbooks have sometimes cost more than \$400 each, and last year he paid over \$1800 for textbooks in his program.



As Mike prepares for his Fall semester, he sees that he has to take BIOL 221, Human Anatomy and Physiology. He notices that the section being offered by Professor Smith has zero textbook costs.

Mike logs in to BIOL 221 on the first day and is pleasantly surprised to see that he can access his free textbook online, right from the course No access codes, no strings! He is able to access all of his assigned readings immediately from day one, which really helps him keep up with the difficult material



BIOL 221 have textbook costs listed as high as \$300. Mike chooses Professor Smith's section with the free textbook, which will help him reduce his hours at his parttime job and be able to manage a full course load


During Fall 2018 semester, sixteen colleges reported usage of Open Educational Resources (OER) to the Michigan Colleges Online. See listing below. Muskegon Community College is new to this semester's report.

Colleges reported the courses using OER or no cost instructional materials and number of students enrolled in each course. The MCO OER Steering Committee agreed in fall 2016 to determine cost savings for students based on the multiplier of \$100 per student. This multiplier is a common method used throughout the nation to reflect the multiple options - such as purchasing used texts, rentals, etextbooks, etc. - that students may/can use when purchasing a required textbook. Because there may not be a commercial text by which we can compare savings to, this report will show the estimated cost savings based on the \$100 per student multiplier for each course.




Future Directions





'Z-degree' gives texts for free to Central Lakes College students

Brainerd campus joins growing trend of using online material to cut costs for college students.

At Minnesota state colleges, students spend an average of \$1,000 a year on textbooks alone.

But in Brainerd, they can earn a two-year degree without paying a penny for books.

Central Lakes College has joined a growing national movement to ditch pricey textbooks in favor of material that can be found online for free.

This semester, it launched one of the state's first "Z-degrees," meaning that all the required readings — in this case, for an associate of arts degree — are available at zero cost to students.

"For a lot of students that are living in poverty, every penny counts," said Martha Kuehn, dean of liberal arts and sciences at Central Lakes, a community and technical college with 6,000 students. "It really makes a big difference for them if we can reduce or eliminate their textbook costs."

Already, nearly 10 percent of college instructors nationwide say they use free online textbooks in their courses, according to a 2017 report by the Babson Survey Research Group.





NOTES: 1. Net tuition revenue used for capital debt service included in the above figures.



What is a "Compact"

- An agreement between states that provides an effective solution to suprastate problems.
- Compacts enable the states—in their sovereign capacity—to act jointly and collectively, generally outside the confines of the federal legislative or regulatory process.
- As an instrumentality of state government, compacts have broad authority to act on the state's behalf within the scope of the authorizing language
- Compacts are self-regulated and adaptable to meet changing needs


